Dear Congregants,

I am deeply honored to serve as your student rabbi this upcoming year. As I enter my fourth year at the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College, I bring with me stories from my time working for the Jewish community and all the other parts that make me who I am today. What I look forward to the most is not only sharing these stories with you but *hearing your stories*. There's an old Yiddish saying that asks, "Why were human beings created? Because God loves stories." I love this saying because it embodies the playfulness of Yid-

dish culture, while also acknowledging that our lives play out in ways we might not have expected—but at least it humors God!

This saying is also connects with another piece of Yiddish wisdom, "What happens when people make plans? God laughs." I'll tell you a story about a girl who knew she wanted to be a rabbi since she was young. She even used to play "rabbi" with her stuffed-animals and line them up for her shabbat services in the living room. This girl grew up, went to college at Temple University, and decided the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College was where she belonged. However, she felt that she

needed some real work experience between college and rabbinical school and decided to take a chance and apply for an Education Fellowship at the Institute of Southern Jewish Life. She had never been to Jackson, MS, and knew no one there, but she decided she'd take the plunge. It was just a two year fellowship, after all, and once it was over she'd be back in Philadelphia and would begin rabbinical school! Before she left for Jackson, she called the rabbinical college and said, "I'm off to Jackson, see you in two years!" Well, that was one moment when God must have had a great laugh.

The Borscht Belt Comes To Bethlehem, PA!

The ‘Borsht Belt or ‘Jewish Alps’ is a colloquial term for the (now mostly defunct) summer resorts of the beautiful Catskill mountains. ‘Borsht Belt’ hotels, bungalow colonies, and summer camps were frequented by Jews from New York, New Jersey, and Philadelphia. These families were often denied accommodations in other hotels and resorts, due to anti-Semitism, particularly in the 1940’s—1960’s.

Night life in the Borsht Belt was typically comprised of Jewish stand-up comedians. These performers created a style of humor, character-

ized by self-deprecation, playing on Jewish stereotypes, and liberal use of Yiddish expressions. In an ironic twist of fate, this unique form of humor became hugely popular in the entertainment industry, as did the long list of groundbreaking performers.

This year, we introduced a monthly program: “The Borsht Belt Comes to Bethlehem, Pa”. On Sunday afternoons, our congregation came together to enjoy watching movies of Jackie Mason, Don Rickles, and Jack Klugman (What To Eat For Passover), while munching on popcorn and drinking their favorite beverage. We continue our series on

Sunday, September 11, with ‘Zelig’, starring Woody Allen and Mia Farrow. Upon its release, the New York Times’ reported, “Woody Allen’s new film is uproariously funny and a cinematic marvel”.

Sunday, October 30, we bring our members the movie: “The Producers”, (written by Mel Brooks) and starring Zero Mostel and Gene Wilder. Our upcoming movies will feature Joan Rivers, Henny Youngman, Rodney Dangerfield, Billy Crystal, along with the movies: “Keeping Up With The Steins” and “Oy Vey, My Son is Gay”.
